A story was told by Don Southerland in his book Transitioning about two boys, Travis and Garrett, which were each given a block of wood and a pocket knife. Both boys began to carve away at their block of wood.

Both boys were working hard, enjoying the task and serious about their work but when they each finished their block of wood the results were completely different.

Travis carved a boat and Garrett simply carved a pile of shavings.

So what was the difference?

The answer is Travis had a vision. He could see the end result. He knew from the start what his block of wood should look like. He knew from the start where he was going with his whittling and how to get from where he was to where he wanted to be. He had a purpose, a target, and a strategy for getting there. Garrett, who worked equally hard, ended up with just shavings. He was just whittling.

You might be a businessman who owns a business or runs part of a company. Many companies go out of business because they haven't developed a "business plan" or a vision.
